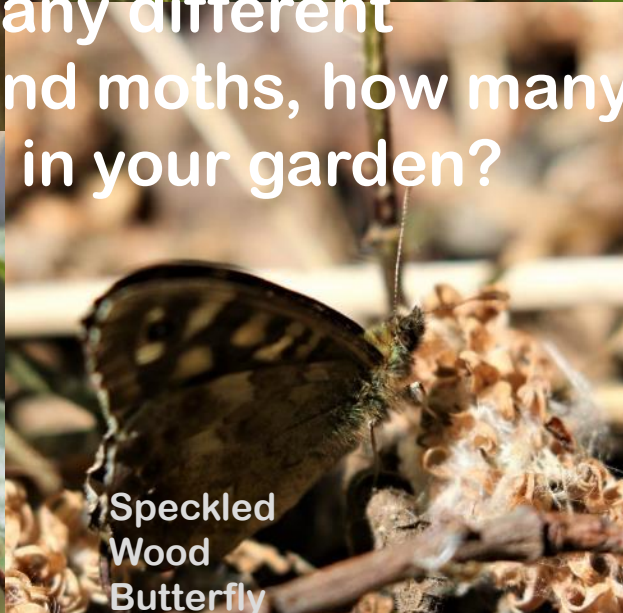

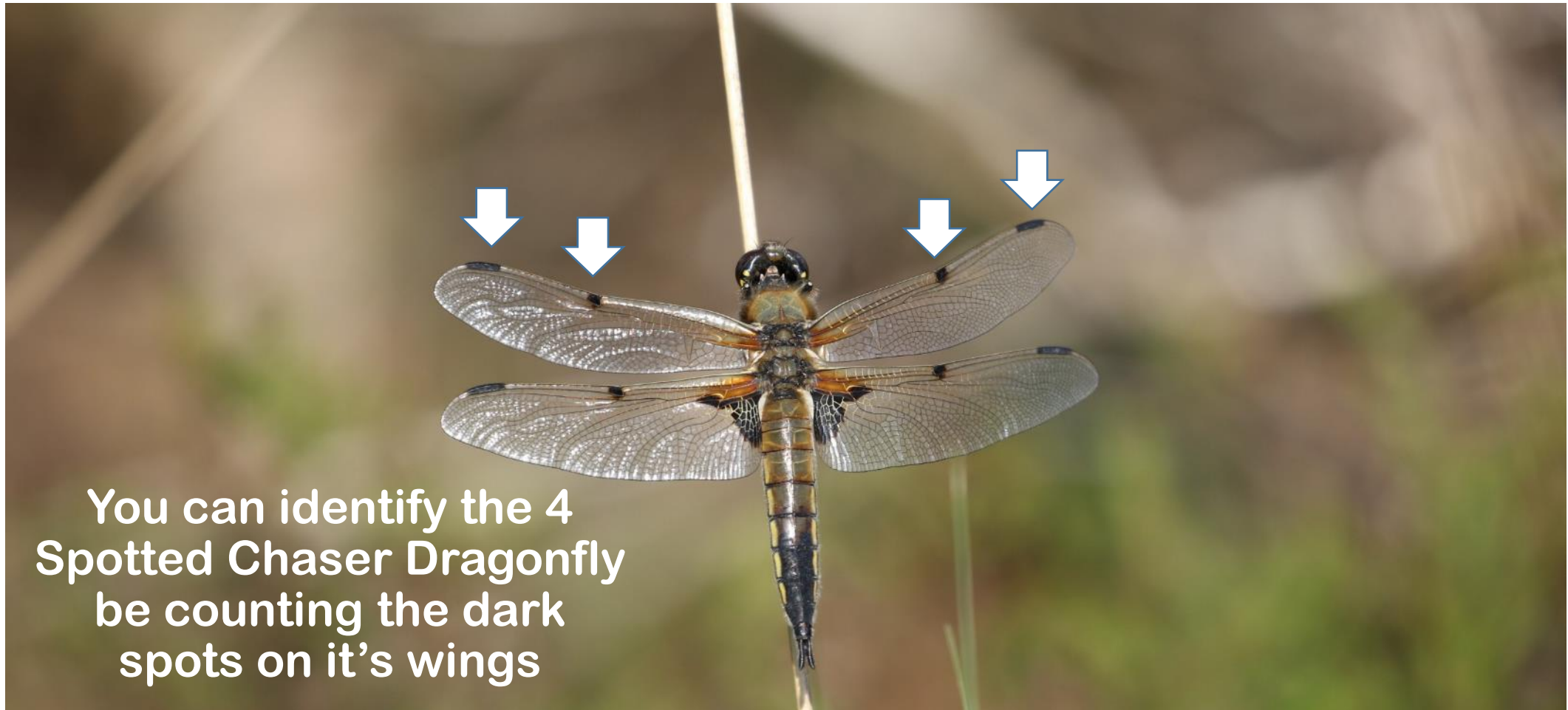

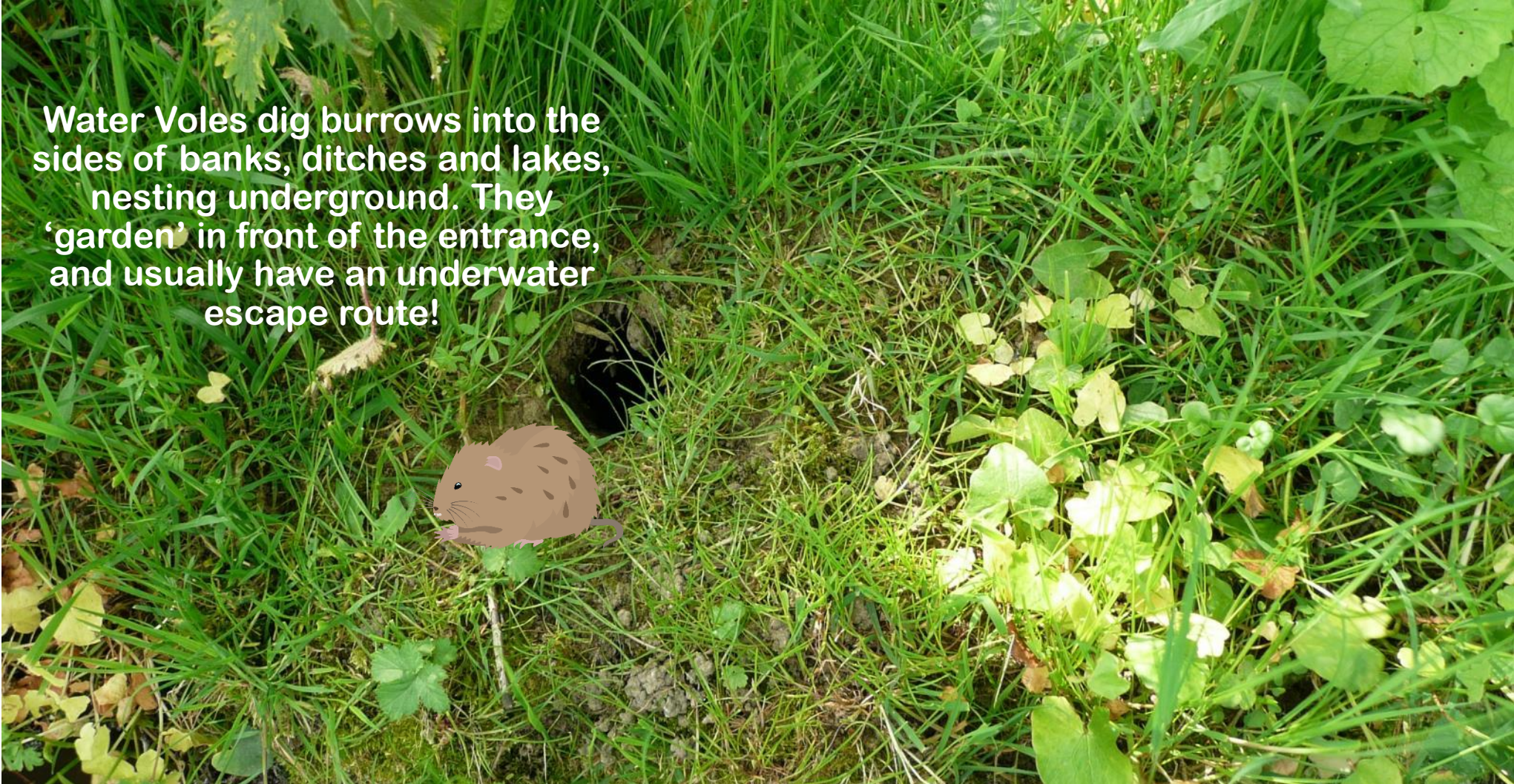
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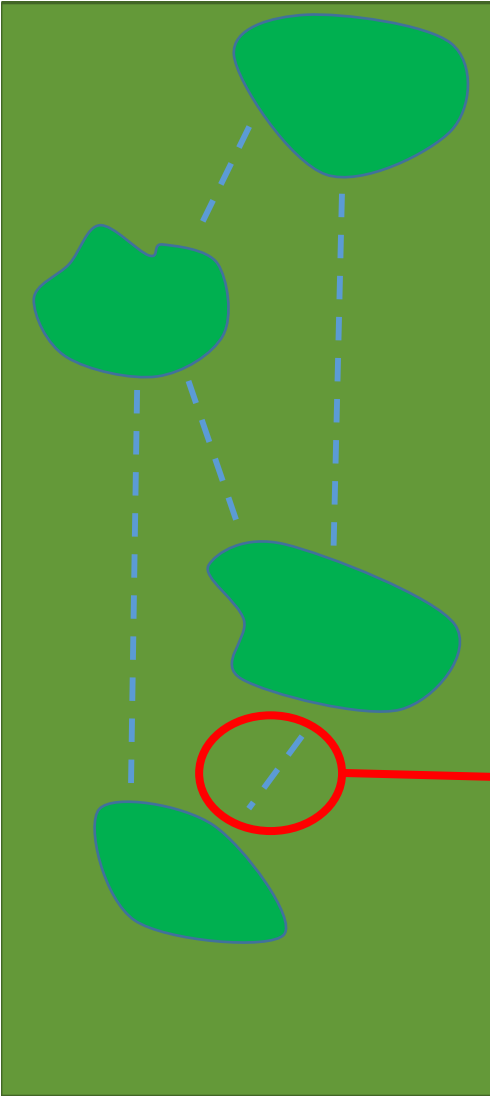
You can identify the 4

Who's hiding in your....?

Water Voles dig burrows into the sides of banks, ditches and lakes, nesting underground. They 'garden' in front of the entrance, and usually have an underwater escape route!



Who's hiding in your....?



Wildlife corridors are an important habitat, but what is a wildlife corridor?

- A way for animals to move from place to place.
- Connecting wildlife from one place to another.
- Some animals need to move to survive i.e. migrate to where there is more food or where it is warmer.
- Having lots of green spaces close to each other will help connect wildlife that have been separated by people!

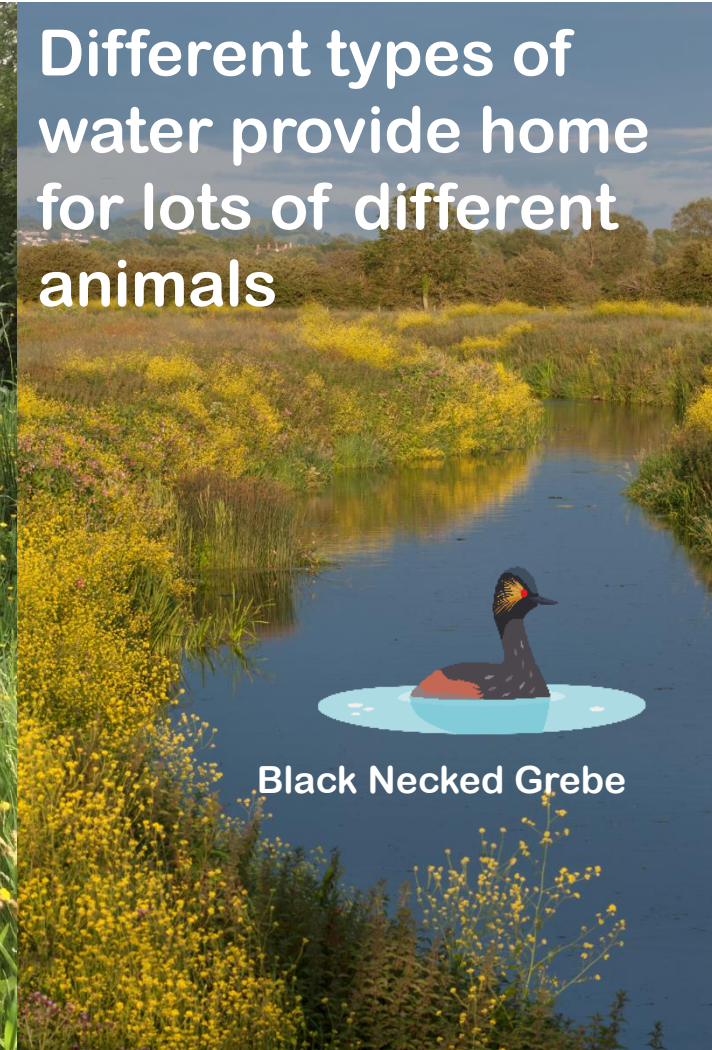

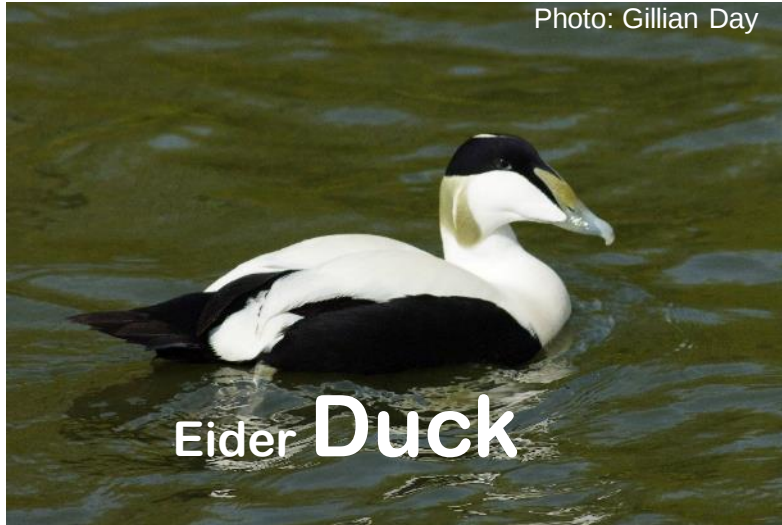
